




Unified Cross Domain Management Office

CHARTER



March 2007

A. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Charter is to set forth the agreement of the parties on the responsibilities, functions and operation of the Unified Cross Domain Management Office (CDMO).

B. SCOPE

This Charter applies to all elements within the purview of the ASD (NII)/DoD CIO and the ADNI & CIO.

C. BACKGROUND

The Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) and the Department of Defense (DoD) have established a unified CDMO which supports information sharing objectives by expediting the delivery of cross domain capabilities to the field. The CDMO was established to provide centralized coordination and oversight of all cross domain activities and ensure a common approach for the implementation of cross domain capabilities within the DoD and the IC.

D. MISSION

The CDMO's mission is to provide centralized coordination and oversight of all cross domain activities and investments for the DoD and the IC, and shall:

- a. Be the central focus for all cross domain activities to include requirements and technologies.
- b. Synthesize cross domain requirements to evaluate priorities and common problem sets, and identify opportunities for requirements consolidation.
- c. Recommend the standardization of cross domain requirements and solutions to minimize redundant or duplicative systems development and acquisition.
- d. Encourage the development and use of enterprise cross domain capabilities.
- e. Coordinate research and development efforts for cross domain technologies, to include the development of unique cross domain capabilities, and seek partnerships with academia, industry, and U.S. Government agencies, consistent with applicable law.
- f. Develop and oversee, in accordance with requirements promulgated by the ASD (NII)/DoD CIO and the ADNI & CIO, a cross domain baseline for enterprise-wide implementation.

- g. Develop a Cross Domain Roadmap, which builds upon the cross domain baseline and identifies modular components, technologies, and capabilities needed to meet unified requirements, to include those of the associated enterprise architectures.
- h. Develop, coordinate and align DoD and IC cross domain standards, policies, and processes.
- i. Monitor, coordinate, and recommend resource allocation for cross domain activities.
- j. Support other cross domain related activities as directed by the Oversight Panel.
- k. Establish and manage CDMO websites.

E. AUTHORITIES

The Oversight Panel will serve as the authoritative decision-making body that directs, oversees, and approves the CDMO's activities. The ASD (NII)/DoD CIO and the ADNI & CIO shall serve as co-chairs of the Oversight Panel and each may invite persons from the community to participate on the Oversight Panel depending upon the agenda. The J-6, Joint Staff will be a permanent member of the Panel.

All CDMO activities will be subject to the direction, oversight, and approval of the Oversight Panel and in a manner consistent with this Charter. As required, the CDMO is authorized to enter into Memoranda of Understanding and Agreement (MOU/MOA) with the DoD and the IC entities.

The CDMO will provide centralized coordination and oversight of all cross domain activities and initiatives across the DoD and the IC and will address cross domain needs based upon priorities validated by the Oversight Panel.

F. KEY POSITIONS

The CDMO will have three key positions as directed in the Establishment Memorandum: the Director, Deputy Director and the Technical Director. The three key positions will be rotational assignments nominated from the DoD and the IC. NSA, DNI, and DIA, respectively, will recommend appointments to these positions for approval by the Oversight Panel

The Director shall manage the CDMO and ensure that cross domain recommendations affecting the DoD and the IC are coordinated with the appropriate DoD and IC elements prior to presenting them to the Oversight Panel for decision. The Director will ensure that all CDMO activities are accomplished in accordance with this Charter and guidance from the Oversight Panel.

The Deputy Director shall, assist the Director in all of the Directors' duties, and serve as the acting Director during the Director's absence.

The Technical Director (TD) is the primary technical consultant and advisor to the Director and Deputy Director of the CDMO. The TD will lead the development of the CDMO technical roadmap; apply established information system security guidance, directives and standards to objectives of the CDMO; coordinate with academia, industry and U.S. government laboratories to define the cross domain information technology; and represent the CDMO as an information architecture expert.

G. REPORTING AND COORDINATION

The Director of the CDMO will report directly to the Oversight Panel for all matters relating to cross domain activities and initiatives.

The Director of the CDMO will coordinate with the Director NSA on CDMO administrative and facilities support matters.

The Director of the CDMO shall provide briefings to the Oversight Panel, as required. At a minimum on a quarterly basis, the CDMO shall prepare and present reports outlining progress to date and planned activities to the Oversight Panel for approval and distribution to the DoD and IC.

H. RESOURCES

1. Personnel – Personnel from the DoD and the IC will be assigned or detailed to the CDMO on a rotational basis. The authority to evaluate and supervise personnel serving in the CDMO will remain with the parent organization. The Director of the CDMO, through his or her Division Chiefs, shall provide written input to parent organizations describing accomplishments and performance for evaluations and award recommendations .

2. Funding – Each organization will pay for its respective participation, including the participation of its personnel. All resources will remain with the parent organization. Subject to the availability of funding, the signatories shall budget to support the CDMO and the activities described herein


